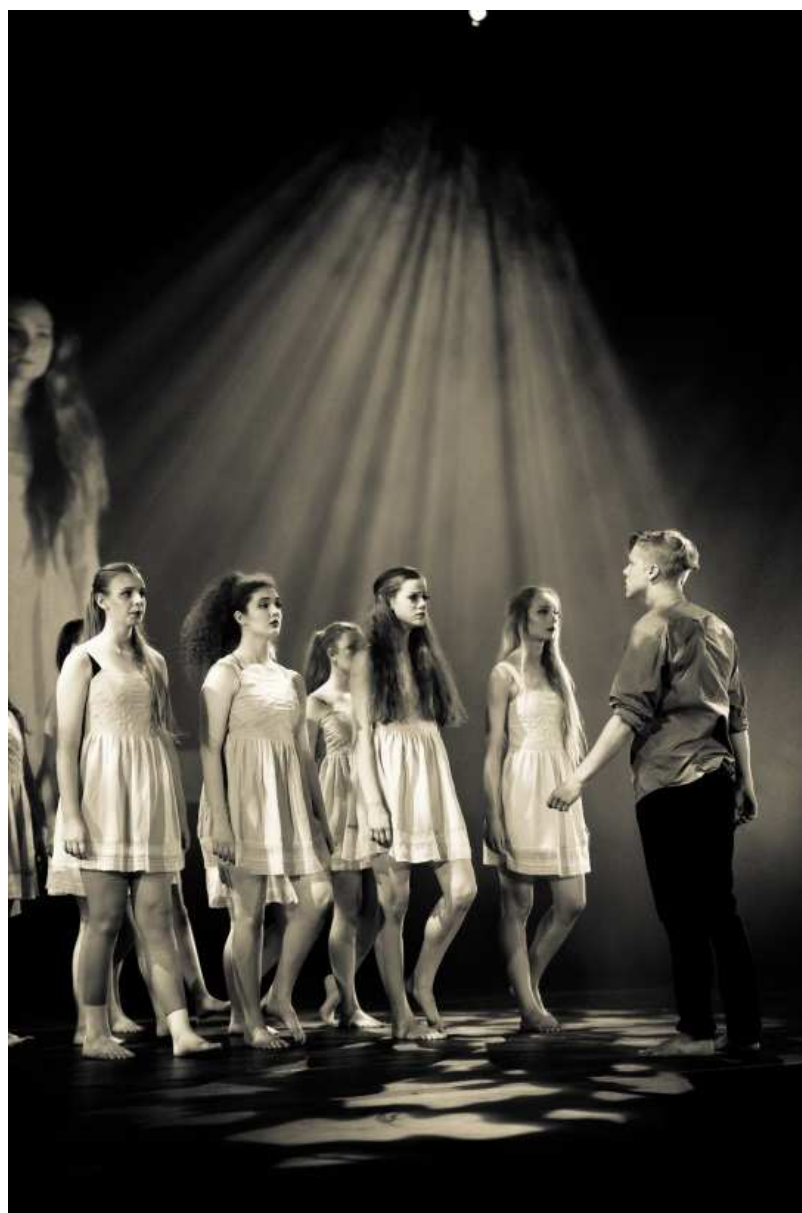

Drama club has commenced for the year, this is an extension opportunity for our Senior Drama students (Years 10-12). No Hands, No Feet, No Excuses! Johaan Kaa Speaks to Year 10 Students



During Senior Study Skills this term, Year 10 students were privileged to hear Johaan Kaa speak. Johaan uses his life story to talk to students about resilience – the essential life skill of being willing and able to bounce back from the challenges life throws our way. His openness and honesty as he takes students through his journey is inspirational.

Johaán lost his hands and feet to Meningococcal Disease 3 years ago. He spent 170 days in hospital, enduring many surgeries, not even able to have his 3 small children visit. For many of us, this would be the perfect excuse to give up, but not Johaan. Instead of feeling sorry for himself he chose to work with the Redlands Community where he lives with his family to improve the lives of people living with disabilities. He became a Youth Mentor and has worked extensively in high schools encouraging students to be the best they can be. He works with community organisations to help the homeless and victims of domestic violence and with the PCYC in their Beating the Odds Program. In addition to all of this Johaan works tirelessly to raise funds to buy bionic hands so he can become more independent.

Earlier this year, Johaan was presented with the Flag of Brisbane in recognition of his work in the community.

Johaans' message is simple - "No hands, no feet, no excuses". It serves to remind us all that disability is not the end. He inspired our students to consider those with disabilities who face incredible challenges every day, and to never give up on their dreams of realising their own potential, no matter what life throws our way. We look forward to hearing Johaan speak to our students again in the future.
